An Italian Straw Hat - Take 2

An Italian Straw Hat was the first production that took place in the current theatre building. It followed a mammoth effort by the founding members of the theatre (and their families) to make the former Methodist Church Sunday school building into a viable venue, having only acquired it in November 1960.

The opening night sounds like a gala evening, with the Lord and Lady Mayoress in attendance, and 'Midland News' there to film the event. However, behind the scenes, things were very different. The "Players" had been working through the night to ensure everything was in place, including the much-disputed bar; when negotiating for the purchase of the building, the Methodist Deacons did not want alcohol to be sold on the premises. However, the Players knew that a bar would be a necessary source of income to make the building viable – still very true today! – and fortunately the Deacons relented.

One of our remaining founder members, Christine Murly remembers that first night in the building;

"I remember the Lady Mayoress asking, "Where are the toilets?" I was mortified! The way round the back then was along a very muddy plank and I was praying that the light worked in the loo when she finally reached it. Denzil (Pugh), as Chairman, and I, as Secretary, were the welcoming party for the main guests and then we had to dash backstage to change and make up before going on the stage."

Christine's experience of the first production, exemplifies the variety of roles that people played in its success. Another member, who had worked in the building until 3am to get it ready, was playing a soldier in the production; he was so tired that he kept nodding off in his sentry box! The choice of An Italian Straw Hat, was in part due to the fact it had many parts, which meant that it gave those who had worked so hard to get the building ready the opportunity to be in the production too.

The achievement of those early years cannot be overstated, and Christine reflects of that first performance:

"I remember looking out at the audience when making our final curtain call and thinking - the audience are still there — the floor hasn't given way and they are not sitting in the foundations."

60 years on, those foundations are proving extremely solid indeed.

"This week sees the realisation of a five year dream; a three year possibility; a two year probability; eighteen months planning; and three months hard labour: we now have our own theatre."

DIRECTORS NOTES

The ability to have a building of your own is such a privilege for a theatre company - it means you do not have to constantly search out and pay for venues and it offers such liberation in terms of artistic freedom to put on exactly what you want, when you want to. But our building is also more than just bricks and mortar - it is the heart of our company, and the structure around which we build our community. It is the hub of our activities, the place in which we create, learn, and grow as artists and people, socialise with good friends and family, share stories, and cry and sing and laugh and dance. We have felt the loss of our 'place and space' so keenly during the pandemic and it has made us all the more eager to make the most of it when we can finally get back inside its creaky, wonky double front doors and start to make live theatre on stage again.

This is why we owe such a debt of gratitude to those founder members of the Criterion Players who worked so hard to achieve their own theatre building sixty years ago. That we are not only still here, but are thriving as a theatre company, is testament to the foresight, tenacity, enthusiasm, and commitment of that small group back in 1961. They were willing to take the risk (including in some cases, raising money against their own houses) to make their dream happen - a theatre company that would hold itself to the highest of artistic quality standards-The Criterion Theatre.

It seemed a perfect idea, and right and fitting therefore, to honour and celebrate that great achievement, by producing the same play that opened the Criterion Theatre building on the very same night as sixty years ago. Back then, the French farce, 'An Italian Straw Hat' was specifically chosen as the first play because it had sufficient parts to involve all of the Company. While our Company is considerably larger now, I similarly wanted our new production to be something that sought to involve as many people as possible. Even in these strange Covid-19 conditions, with everything online and at a distance, it has been a joyous rehearsal experience, mixing very experienced Criterion stalwarts, with some people who are 'on stage' for the very first time, and who we might usually have seen building sets or working in wardrobe and props teams. The online form as it always does, has set us new challenges. For example, how to make a farce come alive without any

onstage action? Characterful acting of course, some use of illustrations and music, and the addition of a narrator, whose job it is to bring the stage directions alive and keep the audience up to speed with what is going on.

I would like to thank the whole 'Straw Hatters' team for coming on this zany adventure with me. The cast for all their energy and gusto within their Zoom boxes. Sally and Erica for their beautiful props created at home to be used by actors all over Coventry. Pam for coping with our lockdown conditions, by showing me costume pieces from the door of the theatre while I waited to select them, masked up in the car park. Dave for putting together the music clips and slotting them into the action. Special thanks to Keith for helping me select which of the many adaptations of the play would be most suita-ble, for some good advice to a novice director of the farce genre, and for once again widening my musical knowledge.

PLAY READINGS


Finding ways of keeping creative during the lockdown has been a challenge, but the Criterion's Play Reading Group offers another way of enjoying the magic of theatre in your own home.
