Director's Notes

I had only seen one or two episodes of the television series "Only When I Laugh" in the early 80's, and could only vaguely recall it. However it does seem I was in the minority, and it that it was received very well at the time. When I read the stage play it was without the memory of Peter Bowles and James Bolam in the leading roles, or indeed Richard Wilson playing the surgeon.

Having been in hospital myself several times over the last ten years, (not in Men's surgical) the humour in Eric Chappell's writing really struck a chord. The last time I was in for five days and wrote a journal. I knew there was a play in there somewhere.

This production has been a bit of a 'roller coaster'. I was aware that we would not be able to get on stage for awhile due to the refurbishment of the stage, wardrobe department, and replacement roof, but had not really realized the enormity of the project.

We have rehearsed in a room in Pete Gillam's house, a variety of rooms in the Methodist church hall, and the bar. It has been quite an experience observing the three lead actors (especially Pete Bagley) balancing precariously on tables, chairs and stools in these various rehearsal areas. Not once did any of the cast complain. They just got on with it. "What troopers."

The rehearsals have been amazing, with a lot of laughter, but massive commitment and team work.






Andrew Tyrer (Dr Gibbs)
